Dear Mr. Jones:

I am writing to strongly urge the Georgia Composite Medical Board to immediately revoke the medical license of Dr. Nisha Verma, a Georgia-licensed obstetrician and gynecologist, based on statements she made during a public hearing before the United States Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

During that hearing, Dr. Verma was asked a direct and straightforward question by Senator Josh Hawley: "Can men get pregnant?" Rather than providing a clear, scientifically grounded response, Dr. Verma declined to answer and instead offered statements referring to "different identities" and characterized the question as political in nature. When pressed again to acknowledge a basic biological reality, she refused to say that men cannot get pregnant.

This is not a hypothetical or political inquiry. It is a fundamental question of human biology. Pregnancy is a biological function exclusive to females, and men cannot become pregnant. Clear understanding of biological sex differences is foundational to the safe and competent practice of medicine, particularly in the field of obstetrics and gynecology.

Dr. Verma's unwillingness to affirm and answer an established biological fact raises serious concerns about her clinical judgment, scientific integrity, and patient safety. Medical professionals are expected to rely on science and evidence-based principles and failure to do so undermines trust in the medical profession and risks compromising patient care.

If Dr. Verma rejects this basic fact, what other scientific realities is she ignoring or rewriting on the basis of wokeness?

Any physician who is unwilling to clearly answer that men cannot become pregnant should not be licensed to practice medicine in the State of Georgia. You wouldn't trust a mechanic who doesn't believe in oil changes to fix your car; Why should Georgians be expected to trust a physician who similarly rejects the basics? For these reasons, I request that the Georgia Composite Medical Board take immediate action to revoke Dr. Verma's medical license.
